

APA Reference Format Simplified

APA 7th Edition (2019) requires a hanging indent and double-spacing for its references. Always use italics, not underlining, when required (for example, with book and journal titles).

Note: If a source is found online, always include the DOI or URL. A retrieval date is not necessary for most resources. Use a retrieval date when citing a source that is likely to change (e.g., Twitter, Facebook, Google maps).

List is alphabetized by authors' last names. All authors' names are inverted.

The first line of an entry is at the left margin; subsequent lines indent ½".

Double-spacing is used throughout.
