

WORD ORDER

Look at the order of the different parts of these sentences.

<i>Doctors</i>	<i>diagnose</i>	<i>patients' illnesses.</i>
<i>Nurses</i>	<i>are</i>	<i>responsible for taking care of patients.</i>
<i>Patients</i>	<i>complain</i>	<i>frequently.</i>
<i>They</i>	<i>complain</i>	<i>about the service in the hospital.</i>

Notice that all these sentences follow the same order.

Subject	Verb	Realization (what comes after the verb)
---------	------	---

Most sentences in English follow this **Subject - Verb - Realization** order.

If you follow this basic order when you write a sentence, your writing will be clearer.

There are a few exceptions to this basic order of sentences:

1. Questions

Helping Verb	Subject	Main Verb	Realization
<i>Do</i>	<i>hospitals</i>	<i>have</i>	<i>adequate sanitary conditions?</i>
<i>Have</i>	<i>hospitals</i>	<i>improved</i>	<i>infection control procedures?</i>
Main Verb (<i>BE</i> Verb)	Subject		Realization
<i>Are</i>	<i>hospitals</i>		<i>safe?</i>

2. Requests/Commands

Subject (implied but not said)	Verb	Realization
(you)	<i>turn</i>	<i>the light on, please.</i>
(you)	<i>submit</i>	<i>your assignment on time.</i>

3. Sentences with *There is/There are* *

Dummy Subject	<i>BE</i> Verb	Actual Subject	Realization
<i>There</i>	<i>is</i>	<i>a problem</i>	<i>that needs to be solved.</i>
<i>There</i>	<i>are</i>	<i>problems</i>	<i>that need to be solved.</i>

* Notice that in a sentence starting with *There is/There are*, *There* is not the subject. The subject comes after the verb. Make sure that the subject and the verb agree.

Common errors with word order:

Error	Incorrect	Correct
Missing subject	<i>Is an important problem.</i>	<i><u>It</u> is an important problem.</i>
Missing <i>there</i>	<i>In the country are many problems.</i>	<i>In the country, <u>there</u> are many problems.</i>
Question word order used in a statement	<i>The scientists do not know <u>why is the disease spreading.</u></i>	<i>The scientists do not know <u>why the disease is spreading.</u></i>
